Entry to these roles:

To become a Parks team member you typically need a combination of relevant education and practical skills such as:

- Certificate III in Horticulture (Parks and Gardens): This qualification provides foundational knowledge and practical skills specific to maintaining parks and gardens. It covers topics such as plant identification, soil management, irrigation, pest and disease control, and machinery operation.
- **Certificate III in Arboriculture**: Alternatively, specializing in arboriculture (tree care and management) can also be beneficial, especially if the role involves significant tree maintenance tasks.
- Other Relevant Certificates: Courses in landscape construction, machinery operation (e.g., chainsaws, mowers), and occupational health and safety are valuable additions.
